

non-denominational public primary and secondary schools (government run, free to all), as well as private denominational and non denominational private primary and secondary schools (privately run, fee based). Enrollment in government schools works by a boundary system, like the UK, and proof of residence for school catchment areas has to be supplied.

Public schools are free, but minimal expenses such as uniforms, books and stationary expenses, and some 'voluntary' contributions are expected from parents.


Sydney also has a small number of selective secondary schools, which students can apply for via a testing system. Places are limited and difficult to attain.

The NSW school year begins at the end of January, with four terms throughout the year. An excellent resource on NSW public schools can be found at www. schools.nsw.edu.au, which includes a rating system of all NSW schools (including private schools).

Private schools are a popular alternative in NSW, particularly for secondary education. The majority of Sydney schools are extremely hard to get into, and many families have their children down on waiting lists from birth.


They also vary a great deal in price fees can range from A\$3,000 (£1,631) per year to top schools costing up to A\$28,000 (£,15,230) per year!

With over 500 suburbs to choose from, deciding where to live in Sydney requires plenty of research and planning...

hen it comes to housing, Sydney is expensive and thanks to an overheated property market, buying into your slice of paradise, and even renting it will cost you!

Sydney's median house price is A\$844,000 (£,459,088). The market has been hot, and prices of houses have risen by about 17 per cent just in the past year.

With over 500 suburbs to choose from, deciding where to live can be overwhelming, but there are many resources to help you with planning where your next home will be. Handy websites to research property to rent or buy include www.domain.com.au, www.realestate.com.au, www.airbnb. com.au and www.gumtree.com.au.

Sydney's suburbs are divided into areas in relation to the city's CBD and harbour.

# Eastern suburbs (\$\$\$, best for beaches and nightlife)

Sydney's glamorous side features world famous beaches like Bondi and Bronte, as well as hip neighbourhoods like Potts Point and Paddington. Sydney-siders flock here for great restaurants and bars. It's also where Centennial Park is, a fantastic place to cycle, go horse riding or simply unwind. Housing options include a broad range of expensive houses and apartments. Inner West (\$\$, best for great schools and families).

Sydney's bohemian home features trendy multicultural suburbs such as Newtown and Marickville, with great nightlife and restaurants. This area also features beautiful harbourside neighbourhoods like Balmain and Drummoyne. Housing options include houses and apartments varying in price, usually in relation to proximity to the city.



# North Shore and Northern Suburbs (\$\$\$, best for a choice of private schools and harbour views)

Find plenty of old school charm, with beautiful harbourside suburbs such as Mosman and Balmoral. The area has some of the most expensive houses in the city. Many of Sydney's private schools are in the upper and lower north shore. House prices vary depending on proximity to the city and public transport.

# Northern Beaches (\$\$, best for beach lovers and families)

This area offers a laid-back lifestyle with beautiful beachside suburbs such as Manly, Dee Why, Palm Beach. It is perfect for families, but longer commute times if travelling to the city for work. Houses and apartments are available, but most expensive are those near the beach. Hills District (\$, best for

# infrastructure and families).

This area is popular with families due to

its more affordable and larger blocks, leafy neighbourhoods, good schools and infrastructure. Suburbs include Castle Hill and West Pennant Hills.

### Western City (\$, best for being affordable and families).

An increasingly popular option, this areas offers great infrastructure with recent improvements in public transport. Multicultural and vibrant hubs include as Parramatta and Penrith. The area also offers more housing options with family friendly housing developments, and a more relaxed rural lifestyle option in outer areas such as Camden and the Blue Mountains.

# St George and the Shire (\$, best for a laid-back lifestyle beside the water)

With charming suburbs like Cronulla and Botany Bay, this area has a diverse range of housing with a great lifestyle thanks to its beachside suburbs and waterways. There's a great choice of houses and apartments, with prices varying according to proximity to the city.
